2. News in Brief

Mature Site Trees – the expensive work of surveying, safety pruning and some felling has now taken place. Expensive – but it hadn't been addressed for many years so there was lots to do and essential to protect the trees and ensure site safety.

Grass is growing a <u>new quieter, electric site mower</u> should be in action soon on the main paths. Most of the smaller paths around plots are a shared responsibility of plotholders on either side to keep the path safe and grass short. It has to your <u>number one priority</u> because of the safety issues. Strimmer Hire – we hope to restart this next Saturday morning April 23rd. The powerful electric strimmers will be on hire with two fully charged batteries – the hire rate will be £10 for an hour. Bring cash as the card reader may not be operational for another week.

Skips & Rubbish – over the last few months we increased the number of rubbish skips to allow the removal of accumulated waste material from plots and encourage plotholders to stop any illegal burning or dumping. The skips are expensive to hire at £200/£300 depending on size ... so ideally, think

twice before bringing that unwanted, "..but I am sure I can find a use for that .." item onto the site!

Peabody Fence – the contractors have remove asbestos and dangerous rubbish from the accumulated mounds along the new Peabody fence. A better path has now been created and the residual material has been spread out to form an area for a larger wildlife habitat.

Website – a new website is being put together with the help of plotholder Peter Mace. We hope it will be up and running within a few weeks

5. Forget Manure – Grow or Share a Comfrey Patch!

A small patch (1-2 sq. metres) of comfrey (variety Bocking 14 or "Russian Comfrey") on every plot would boost fertility with its high content of potash, nitrogen and phosphorus. Plants stay productive for 20+ years, won't self-seed or invade other growing beds. The leaves can be harvested 2/3 times a year and used as a compost activator, liquid feed or fertilising mulch. Plus if allowed to flower these comfrey plants are a magnet for summer honeybees and bumblebees.

You could buy some small plants, but why not persuade someone to share a bit of one of their growing comfrey plants? It's very easy to propagate from just a piece of root. NB It must be variety Bocking 14 otherwise known as Russian Comfrey – Symphytum x uplandicum. Maximum yield in full sun, but happy in light shade.

If you already have a patch of Bocking 14 comfrey, you could dig up one plant and share. Take cuttings to create 20-30 new plants (some from crown cuttings, but many more from short, 2" sections of root). Pot them up in a compost plus sand/ perlite/ vermiculite mixture and once the plants are established, you could offer them to neighbours, plus increase the size of your own comfrey patch or donate any left to the Stores to sell.

6. Waiting List

The waiting list for an allotment at Rosendale has been closed for several years while we have worked through names on the old list. We are now preparing plans to re-open the waiting list – when the website is back up and running and also proposing changes to make the waiting list system fairer including:

- a lottery of the applications made rather than a first come, first served process
- applying the limit of only one plot per person/household (this is just for new applicants – and not to be applied to existing plotholders)
- a reduced catchment area (currently it covers all Lambeth, half of Southwark and smaller parts of Croydon, Wandsworth and Lewisham)
